

From The Pastor's Desk

Just a few days after I returned from my month-long renewal leave and trip to Egypt last October, I got an email from Rev. Daniel Miranda, our District Superintendent, inviting me and up to two lay members of our congregation to apply to be part of a new area-wide congregational equity initiative as part of the "E" of the Bishop's M.I.L.E - *eliminating racism.* If you're not familiar with the term *equity*,



one gets more than is needed, while the other gets less than is needed. Thus, a huge disparity is created. The assumption is that everyone benefits from the same supports. This is considered to be equal treatment. All 3 can see the game without supports or accommodations because the cause(s) of the inequity was addressed. The systemic barrier has been removed.

I have found the graphic to the left to be very helpful in illustrating the differences between equality and equity in the work of overcoming injustice in whatever forms it presents itself.

As the image shows, equity is a precursor to justice. Wesleyan theology invites us to a transformative relationship with Jesus Christ that bears fruit as just action in the world. That said, the church has been both active and complicit in centering white-dominant culture as the standard for much of our institutional and

congregational life. The work our church has been invited to enter into is about uprooting those standards, evaluating them through different lenses, and determining an inclusive path forward.

After reviewing the materials regarding the *Congregational Equity Cohort* (there's also an *Institutional Leaders Cohort* and one to train people to teach what we are learning), I proposed it to our leadership and, after receiving their blessing to pursue it further, I reached out to Zack Reiber, our Lay Leader-elect at the time, and Ali Norris, a young-adult member of our congregation who serves as the Executive Director of *Mission Community Outreach Center*, a local non-profit that operates a free clothing and hygiene bank (among other household items) to individuals and families in need. Both of them eagerly agreed to be part of our application to the *Congregational Equity Cohort* and in December we learned that our Spokane Valley UMC team had been accepted as one of two churches from the Inland District! Along with Pastor Geoff Helton and the lay team from Audubon Park UMC, our team travels to Portland or Seattle once a month (Jan. to July) to join with lay and clergy teams from 19 congregations from the PNW and OR-ID Conferences to learn together through a cohort process. As part of our work, we commit to taking our learnings back to our local churches as well as committing to influence and support congregations in our districts to do this work in the future.

We do this work with the leadership, coaching and support of Beth Zemsky. Zemsky has consulted with major foundations, non-profit organizations, and faith communities to move institutions from diversity and inclusion aspirations to action. With 35 years of experience in this field, Zemsky has developed tools and processes that have tangible results. At our first gathering in January, she named that we, in the church, use the terms *diversity, equity,* and *inclusion* as if we have shared understanding of their meanings when in reality, we often do not. She defined diversity simply as "counting the people." In other words, keeping track of demographics like age, gender, clergy/lay, ethnicity, etc.

About the Hymn: Precious Lord Take My Hand.

Many people think this great old gospel song was written by the famous big band leader Tommy Dorsey. It wasn't. The author's name is Thomas Andrew Dorsey, and he was the son of a black revivalist preacher. Young Thomas played piano at a vaudeville theater and later in one of Al Capone's Chicago speakeasies and with leading jazz bands. Thomas was converted to Christianity at a national Baptist convention in Chicago in 1921 and began writing hymns and trying to get them published. He became discouraged because it took years to finally get one of his hymns in circulation. In August, 1932, while leading music in St Louis, he was handed a telegram telling him his wife was dead and he later learned that he had also lost a son. "I began to feel that God had done me an Injustice," Thomas later said. "I didn't want to serve him anymore or write anymore gospel songs." But the next Saturday, while alone in a friend's music room, he had a "strange feeling" inside---a sudden calm and a quiet stillness. " As my fingers began to manipulate over the keys, words began to fill in place on the melody, like drops of water falling from the crevice of a rock." Precious lord, take my hand. Lead me on, let me stand. I am tired, I am weak, I am worn.....

Today Thomas A Dorsey is remembered as the "father of gospel music" and the author of hundreds of gospel songs including his equally famous, "Peace in the Valley", which we are planning to sing in the next hymn sing.

Do we listen deeply to one another? Do we invite the authentic voices of those whose life experiences are different from the majority to influence decisions? Do we include?

If diversity is about counting the people and inclusion is about the people counting, then *equity*, There are the kinds of questions this training is encouraging to ask both of ourselves and our

according to Zemsky, is about "outcomes." Do diversity and inclusion make a difference in our actions? Can we analyze our policies and practices to determine who is advantaged and disadvantaged, and reconstruct our systems for equity? Can we sit with the discomfort of uncovering biases to create just systems that reflect our deeply held beliefs that *all* people are of sacred worth and made in God's image? churches and this is the work that Zack, Ali, and I have undertaken on behalf of our congregation and the Inland District. This is long work - not just in terms of the 9-hour trainings we attend (trust us when we say it's been a firehose of information!) but also in the scope of time it takes to bring about systemic change - sometimes years or longer. And yet, this is the good work of eliminating racism that we are called to do - a call voiced by Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth that has its roots in Jesus' Parable of the Samaritan. This is more than training - it is capacity building for our congregation and the Greater Northwest Area of the UMC to increase relationships with all God's people in a manner that is liberative for all.

As Zack, Ali, and I continue our training, we commit ourselves to sharing what we learn so that Spokane Valley UMC can continue to be a community of faith where we celebrate diversity and inclusion with an aim toward equity and justice for all God's children.
