FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Though we're right in the midst of the Summer of 2023, I'm already thinking ahead to the future of worship and ministry at Spokane Valley UMC, and by my estimation, May 19, 2024, has the potential to a very exciting day in the life of the church! In addition to celebrating the birthday of the Church of Jesus Christ on a day of Pentecost, we *may* also be celebrating the baptism and confirmation of faith of several of our youth!

Like many United Methodists, some of our youths were baptized as infants so their parents spoke their baptismal vows for them and promised to raise them in the church. Others were likewise raised in the church but have yet to baptized. With most of our youth at an age where they are ready to start taking the lead on their own discipleship (7th grade+), it's time to offer them the opportunity to undergo the theological and spiritual preparation necessary to make the choice of whether they will "confirm" the faith that their parents' chose for them and take upon themselves the commitment to be faithful disciples of Jesus Christ or choose a different path. And so, it is with great anticipation that I announce that we will be offering a year-long confirmation class for our youth starting this September!

Beginning Sunday, September 10th, youth 7th grade and higher will be invited to dedicate time after worship each week during their traditional Youth Group time (10:45am-12pm) to learning about the Bible, Christian beliefs, what it means to be a disciple, who Jesus was, and more. They will have a chance to study the history, polity and theology of the United Methodist Church and what makes us unique in the world of Christendom. Using a curriculum from Sparkhouse called "re:form" (as in "reformed tradition theology"), we will spend each session watching some fun, animated videos and exploring a main questions through discussion, activities, and prayer. To give you an idea of some of the more than 30 questions (!!) to be explored, here's a small sample:

- Who wrote the Bible, God or humans?
- Is the Holy Spirit a person or wind or fire or what?
- Why should I follow Jesus; can't I just say I believe in him?
- Do I have to believe Jesus performed miracles in order to be a Christian?
- If there is only one God, why are there so many different religions?
- Can I do something bad enough to make God stop loving me?
- What the heck is prevenient grace and do I have to learn geometry to be a Methodist?

Each of these questions are designed to give our youth and the brave adult volunteers who sign up to join us more on that below!) the chance to explore an area of faith while being free to ask even more questions of their own. The ultimate goal of confirmation isn't to teach our young people the stock answers to age-old questions of faith or even pressure them to say "yes" to being confirmed, but to help them nurture a practice of asking questions and turning to God and the church to find ways to grow in understanding their faith.

Twin Lakes History: 95 Years of Twinlow Camp

who wanted to create a little patch of woods on the shores of Twin Lakes (then called Fish Lake), a place for young people to gather. With that vision in mind, Rev. Freeman worked tirelessly to build cabins and a dining hall, dig a well, and clear hundreds of trees. Rev. Freeman, also the first manager of what we now call Twinlow Camp and Retreat Center, wanted a place out of the city where young people could connect with their Creator.

For more thank 90 years, Twinlow has been that place. A place away— a quiet place— a place where young people could go to experience something new and challenging. A culture of grit always exited here in North Idaho, and it was evident at Twinlow from the very beginning. In the 1920s folks had no place to stay overnight here nor any running water. Rev. Freeman, with the help of many volunteers, managed to build a camp from nothing. He knew that water was needed for this place to succeed, so he started by digging a well—by hand—by himself. Legend has it that dug 100 feet by himself before the Camp Commission hired professionals to dig the remaining 240 feet. We still use this well at camp today, and share it with our neighbors.

It started in 1928 and has lasted far beyond that—the culture that all are welcome at Twinlow, that we are a community, and that we are here to offer Christian Hospitality on Holy grounds. During World War II, Twinlow housed soldiers and their families, made room for them to eat together, and offered a place to find peace in a troubled time. "Twinlow always will be a safe haven for all to find adventure, relaxation, and rest.

When Twinlow was founded, it was an escape from the noise of war, of the city, of early century new technology taking over the quiet focus on God. Twinlow remains the same escape 95 years later. We invite you to find adventure, rest, and relaxation. Escape to the wilderness.

With that in mind, our curriculum was chosen because it not only helps to create a space to wrestle with some of the tough issues of faith, but it also ultimately helps teach that part of a life of faith *is* asking questions and prayerfully wrestling with God and trusted faith friends to find the answers. I am very excited to be partnering with Samantha Wallace, our Coordinator for Children's Ministry, who is expanding her current focus to include our youth for the 2023-2024 academic year. Now serving as our *Coordinator of Ministries with Young People*, Samantha will work with me and a few other adult leaders to offer confirmation and other youth group fellowship opportunities this year.

As I mentioned above, we have need for some brave, adult volunteers to make confirmation a faith-filled success! Because a critical mass is always helpful and our youth group is currently a small, but mighty gathering of 4-5 kids and because being discipled by trusted adult mentors is integral to growing one's faith, we're inviting EVERYONE in the congregation to be a part of confirmation! In the middle of August, we will have a sign-up sheet available at the Connect Desk for adult members of the congregation to volunteer to join the confirmation class as an adult "confirmand" for just one week sometime over the next eight months to help boost our class size and witness to the ways in which you've grown as a disciple of Jesus. You can choose a week based on your schedule or, you can take a look at the questions we're going to explore and pick one you'd like to learn more about yourself! No matter which one you choose, you're bound to have fun and be a part of growing the faith of our youth!

I hope you share my excitement about our new confirmation class and the potential to confirm or baptize members of our youth group next May! Please join me in expressing gratitude to Samantha for her willingness to serve and please (please!) consider signing up to join our class one week! Ms. Vonner joined the organization's national staff in 2010 as Assistant General Secretary of Membership and Leadership Development. With reorganization in 2018, she became the Transformation Officer, coordinating the organization's visioning and strategic development to positively impact the lives of women, children, and youth. She oversaw an organizational rebranding that opened new ways for women to join, introduced program innovations and initiatives, and rolled out United Women in Faith as the new public-facing name.

"My primary focus is to continue and expand the mission and reach of United Women in Faith as we put our love and faith in action to change the world, and work to improve the lives of women, children, and youth around the world," Ms. Vonner said. "I commit to lead with faith and trust in God, the support of the directors, the Program Advisory Group, my

colleagues, and most of all, the members of United Women in Faith.

The Texas native has served The United Methodist Church in several other capacities including women's retreat leader, and jurisdictional conference delegate and alternate in 2008, 2016, and 2020 representing the North Texas Annual Conference. Ms. Vonner was an organizer for the denomination's work on immigration assistance, community development initiatives, and dismantling racism work. She was commissioned as a U.S. missionary by the General Board of Global Ministries in 2000 to serve in the North Texas Annual Conference as the Communities of Shalom Coordinator.

Ms. Vonner is a graduate of Perkins School of Theology with a M.Div. and Women's Studies Certification and Texas A&M Commerce with a B.S. in Biology.

A longtime member of First United Methodist Church of Grand Prairie, Texas, she regularly attends Teaneck United Methodist Church in New Jersey, where she is a member of the local United Women in Faith group.

Ms. Vonner enjoys spending time with her adult children, Wesley and Lessie, reading, walking, and traveling.
