Dear Valley Methodist friends,

Earlier on this very day that I write to you I was asked, "if you could capture in one word what all these years of ministry have meant to you, what would that one word be?" I looked away from the questioner, took a moment to think, and then I had it and the verse: treasure. "But we have this treasure in clay jars." (2 Corinthians 4.7)

Sometimes treasure can look like pirate's treasure. As a kid it seems this way, you know an old fashioned chest with its lid popped open gold coins and jewels sparkling. Still, all treasure sparkles in its own way. I'm sure that's why that one word popped into my mind this morning. To sum up what all of ministry means to me in one word, and to choose "treasure" as that word conveys the many sparkles I've had a chance to see in thousands of moments in people's lives.

This past Sunday I saw sparkles in two who decided they wanted to be baptized: Jeremiah Faasala and Paul Watson. Just as profound for a pastor are the sparkles one has a chance to see in the conversations over many months – or in some cases over many years – leading up to the decision, "I want to be baptized." Each conversation is so special, each life is a treasure. The sacrament of baptism, the moment of baptism as special as it is, is one sparkle among many. And it is a commencement also not an end in itself. Baptism is a new beginning. Our entire future life unfolds as a baptized person who has just received proof positive that (s)he is loved unconditionally, forgiven forever, accompanied closely by God every day. Christ is inside us now. We see the intrinsic value of all human life and all creation, through baptism.

Spending my whole career in ministry it's been a great privilege to personally witness countless sparkles in people's eyes and faces, young and old alike. In other words this treasure I've seen has come in moments when people change and grow, learn and risk. People DO sparkle. They sparkle even at their lowest points, when peace and calm bring true comfort. I've seen this. Pain is not able to define us. This treasure is the toughest stuff in the world.

This past Sunday May 22nd nine adults chose to become full members of Spokane Valley United Methodist Church. We welcome these wonderful, faithful people, each one a treasure: All baptized Christians are "members" of the body of Christ. Some of us choose to take vows of local church membership to identify with a place saying publicly, 'right here, this is my community, my church home. Until God leads me elsewhere, from here my faith with grow, and I'll help others grow, through prayer, presence, gifts, service, and witness.'

When I am invited to hear something very deep going on inside another person, I'm speechless.

The treasure continues, the sparkling moments continue.

So what about retirement? What events will show up as sparkles for a retired pastor? It will be different for sure. I won't be "in the saddle" in the same way anymore. But why can't retirement be a commencement as well?! I look forward to it! Having fun times with Missy and our 7 grandchildren – and with all of you now as friends! Wow, talk about sparkles.
