

Pastor Alissa & J'adorra are headed to Regionals!

As you've probably figured out, when I'm not pastoring, I'm horsing around - literally! In the pursuit of my goals in the discipline of dressage, my eight-year-old Dutch Warmblood mare, *J'adorra*, and I competed at First Level at four local horse shows this summer in the hopes of qualifying for the regional competition this Fall. To qualify, we needed to get a minimum of two scores of 62% or higher from two different judges. After securing our first score at the May show, we got our second one in July and are so excited to be traveling to Auburn, WA in September to compete at the United States Dressage Federation Region 6 Championships! My sister, Stacy Meredith, and her gelding, *My Jules Verne* (Jules, for short) also qualified and will be competing as well! To fully focus on this opportunity, I will be taking a week-long vacation Sept. 12-18 and I am grateful to Rev. Brenda Tudor who will fill the pulpit on Sept. 18th. New Upgrades to our Livestream Service!

A few weeks ago, Nate Dunigan, our Technical Ministries Coordinator, presented a proposal to the S/PR requesting funds to upgrade our livestream worship capabilities. With a well-crafted packet of information, Nate laid out the professional short-comings of our current system and named possible solutions. He reminded us of how SVUMC had initially transitioned to online worship in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and, while we thought it might be temporary, the reality is that livestreaming is here to stay. In his introduction, Nate noted that “When we got into the livestream game it was a desperate time...the church was in a bind for retaining a congregation in a time when the church and the congregation needed each other the most. At that time, some of the less professional aspects of our livestream could be overlooked.” But now, acknowledging that many in our congregation are not yet comfortable gathering in crowds or enjoy the virtual format, it’s time “we start taking our livestream more seriously.”

Nate named several problems with the previous set up that result in a less than professional experience for those worshiping with us online: 1) There isn’t video input of the content sent to the projectors which means folks at home only see what’s on the screens by pointing a camera at it which makes it an image of image; 2) We only have one camera so we can’t change camera angles or zoom in/out cleanly meaning the online perspective is often a bit chaotic and dizzying; and 3) It requires a dedicated person to run the livestream while someone else does the camera and slides.

To address these issues, Nate proposed that we acquire two more cameras as well as a video switcher and remote. The cameras, mounted to the left and right of the chancel above eye level, are able to be programmed to follow cues (meaning the person being videoed could, for example, shake their right hand, and it would automatically zoom in on them), can recognize the speaker and track them as they move about, and provides additional camera shots for a variety of perspectives. The video switcher, which looks a bit like a mini-tablet allows the operator to seamlessly switch between cameras and allows for the livestream audience to have direct viewing of the content going to the screens (rather than seeing the screen through the camera). This means that what those in the sanctuary experience *doesn’t* have to dictate what those at home see; rather, we can make their at home viewing experience





catered to their virtual platform while causing no disruption or changes to the in-person experience. Additionally, it allows for PiP or “Picture in Picture” which means, for example, the folks viewing from home can see the song leader *while* also seeing the lyrics to the hymns! The photo included with this article gives you an idea of how this works – you can see Wes Holmquist leading the Hymn sing *and* see the lyrics!

After receiving Nate’s proposal and spending time in discussion about the merits of the upgrades and the possibilities it offers, the members of S/PR along with representatives from Finance and Trustees (and myself!), enthusiastically and unanimously supported its immediate adoption! The next step was to determine from where we would request the funds. The total to purchase these items and pay for the additional work hours for Nate to install them, came to just over \$2100. Again, after some conversation, a proposal was made to consider requesting the funds come from the Memorials Funds. Traditionally, gifts given in memory of a loved one who has passed into glory are reserved for funding things that enhance the beauty of the church or the worship experience or help grow disciples of Jesus Christ – things like a piece of art, a new communion set, or Bibles for high school graduates. In this new digital age of worship, upgrading our livestream offerings so that the worship experience can be more beautiful *and* accessible for those joining us from home seemed a worthy use of those funds. Gerry Bafus contacted the Memorials Committee to make the request, and like the S/PR, they enthusiastically supported funding the upgrades. Gratitude to those whose gifts in memory of loves ones makes our new and enhanced livestream worship experience possible! This investment will help us offer a more professional online option and support our mission to reach new people and invite them into relationship with God!

Please also join me in thanking Nate Dunigan for not only seeing the need and for taking the initiative to research solutions, but also for presenting the proposal in a professional and easy to understand format. Additional thanks to Nate for his time spent installing the new cameras and video switcher – they were put into use as soon as they arrived on Sunday, August 7th. If you have a moment, check out our YouTube channel to see the new format online! Nate and his team, in partnership with the Worship Team and myself, will continue to work together to explore how to use this new technology to its fullest capacity as we make it our aim to continue offering a virtual worship experience at Spokane Valley UMC that is welcoming, accessible, and dynamic!
