The Only Constant in Life... is Change!

Brrr! This morning as I drove the short distance to my parents' house to feed the horses at 6:15 am, my car issued a safety warning about roads potentially being icy and the thermostat read 32 degrees. 32 degrees?! What is going on?! Just weeks ago, I was hanging out poolside sipping iced tea and watching kids from Ethan's Scout Troop splash about in 80 degree weather and now I'm watching them shiver as they try and start their camp stoves after a night of camping in our front field! So fleeting are these last days of short sleeves, sandals and sun hats...now I've got to think about getting the fireplace going, pulling my long underwear out of storage, and parking my snow boots by the back door for the foreseeable future! Despite my proneness to preparation, all



in all, I am not looking forward to the sudden change of seasons this year. Maybe it's because I just spent time on our honeymoon in the Caribbean, but I don't even want to think about prepping the snow blower and having to scrape ice off my windshield after evening meetings at the church. Even though the morning temperatures are already bordering on sub-Artic, I find myself resisting the reality that I need to dress more warmly and at least have a hat and gloves on hand if I'm planning to go outside before 9 am. And I'm in total denial about the need to get all my patio furniture into storage before too long. If I had to sum up my attitude in one sentence, it would be this: I don't like change!

Whether it's the changes of the seasons, or changes to my diet (which after a five-day cruise was a requirement!), or a change in my schedule, I generally approach change with a sentiment of resentment (preceded by some significant feet dragging, loud complaining to anyone who will listen, and exaggerated sighing, (Cont. on pg. 2)

(Cont. from pg. 1) of course). Like many, change makes me feel anxious, uncomfortable, unprepared, and out of my element. If I had my druthers, every day would be 78 degrees with a light breeze, my schedule would be exactly the same as the day before, and my "to do" list would be as predictable as Sunday coming once a week!

And yet, deep down I *know* that change is both an inevitable and divinely dictated part of our lives that is best weathered with an open and trusting heart rather than resistance and resentment. It's hard not to think about the well-known passage from Ecclesiastes 3:1-4 as I lament the changing of the seasons:

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:

a time to be born, and a time to die;

a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;

a time to kill, and a time to heal;

a time to break down, and a time to build up;

a time to weep, and a time to laugh;

a time to mourn, and a time to dance...

Though Qoheleth, the author of Ecclesiastes says it so well, there are many places where scripture teaches us that God is always pushing for change in order to move us into a life-giving future. The prophet Jeremiah (29:11) declares the word of the Lord who says: For surely I know the plans I have for you...plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Through the prophet Isaiah (43:19) God proclaimed this message: I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. And from the apostle Paul (2 Corinthians 5:17) we receive these encouraging words: Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!

As the seasons change from summer to fall, and as we've spent the last few weeks reflecting on our last 85 years of ministry considering all the building projects, ministry initiatives, and experiments with worship (you know, *change*) that previous pastors and church members courageously carried out during their seasons of service, I've been asking God during my personal prayer time to help me know what's next for us. What "new things" does God hope to spring forth amongst us in the coming months and years? What way in the "wilderness" is God making in our present times? What new "rivers" of hope might flow in Spokane Valley through the ministry of our church? What change is God pushing for and how can we open our eyes to see it clearly? I confess that I ask these questions with some trepidation but also with growing excitement – a feeling that I have come to call "anxious exhilaration" which, coincidently, is also the name for how I feel when waiting to ride a roller coaster as I did on my honeymoon!

I will confess that I don't have any clear answers to share just yet, but there are some ideas floating about that the Spirit has been revealing to me and members of our congregation. Ideas like renovating our gym to serve as a community event center for conferences, fundraising banquets, and celebrations. I've heard dreams of expanding our youth and Sunday School programs and visions of a mid-week service of contemplation and prayer. Outside invitations have arrived that ask us to consider supporting refugee families in new ways and to join a sister UM church for volunteer service in global mission settings. Trusting that God is speaking to all of us, I wonder what new things of God has the Spirit shared with you in your times of prayer or in


